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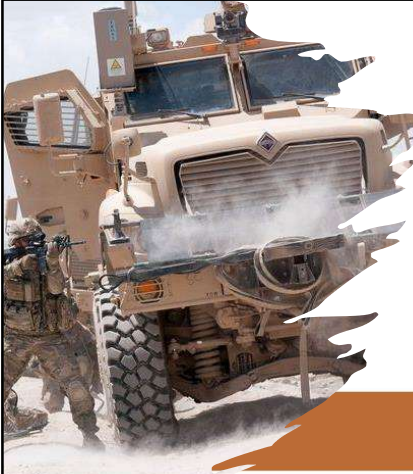

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Military Demographics

- Approximately 200,000 veterans transition out of the military every year <https://www.gao.gov/products/GAO-19-438R>
- 88% Veterans who go to college after transition drop out. https://www.huffpost.com/entry/veterans-college-drop-out_n_2016926
- There are approximately 18.8 million Veterans in the United States. Making up almost 8% of the population.
 - California, Texas, and Florida each have over 1 million Veterans.
 - Dunbars number for individual relationships is 150, if you use a more conservative number of 5 close personal friends, Veterans can directly affect approximately 94 million Americans. 28.6% of America's population.

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Veterans can be a valuable asset

- In the electrical industry, veterans can make a valuable contribution in a number of ways. They can bring their skills and experience to bear on a variety of projects, from new construction to maintenance and repair. They can also help to improve safety on the job site, as they are accustomed to working in accordance with strict safety regulations.
- In addition to their skills and experience, veterans also bring a unique set of values to the workplace. They are typically loyal, dedicated, and hard-working individuals who are committed to excellence. They are also accustomed to working in a team environment, and they are able to adapt to new situations quickly.



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Military Transition

- Military Transition is the time for Service Members to begin focusing on life after the Military.
- The process can begin as early as two (2) years prior to the Service Member's **Expiration of Term of Service** or **ETS**.
- The **last 180 days** of a Service Member's commitment to the Military is the **most critical**.
- The window of time in which Service Members can attend **DOD Skillbridge** and **Army Career Skills Programs**.



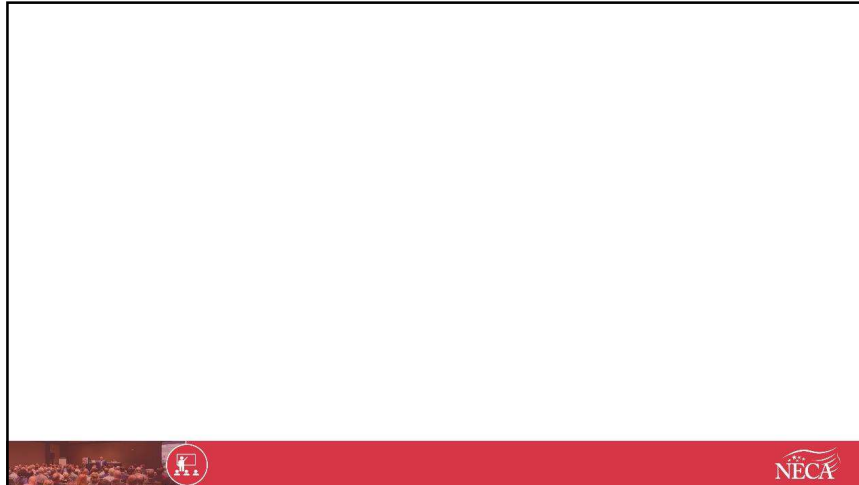
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What is VEEP?



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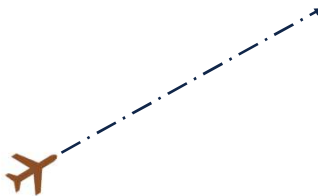

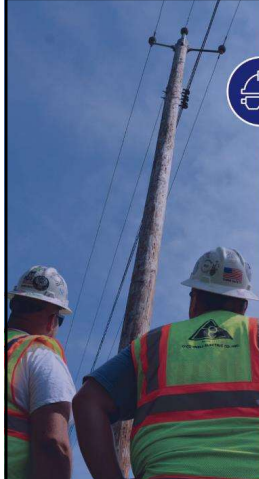

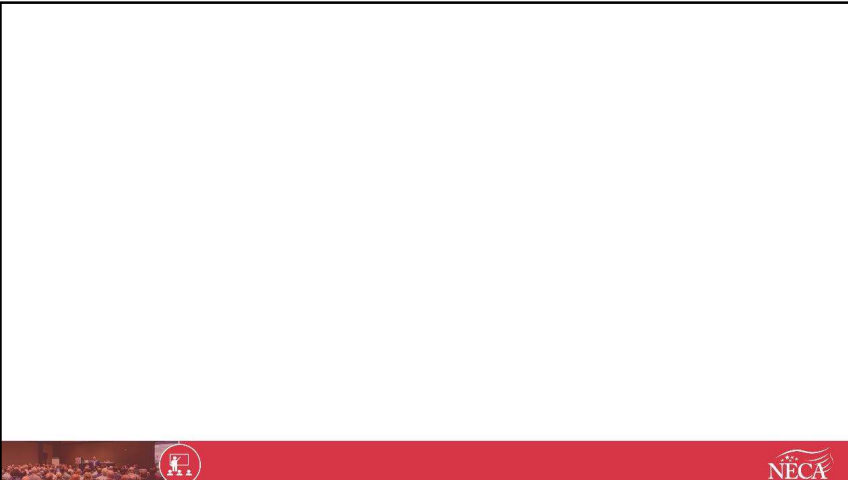

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The biggest advantage of VEEP is that participants are able to select from locations across the United States and know that a career is waiting upon separation.
